Introduction to Accents

Syllable names

Only the last three syllables in a word can take an accent:

Ultima last syllable Antepenult / Penult / Ultima

next to last syllable Penult before the penult syllable Antepenult

Quantity (Short or Long) of vowels and diphthongs

vowels: ε , O; diphthongs: just αl , O l in end-position Short:

vowels: η , ω ; diphthongs: all except αl and αl in end-position; iota subscripts: α , β , ω Long:

Short or Long: vowels α , I, \cup (learn by observing how they act)

Types of Accent & Possible Positions:

antepenult penult ultima **Acute** (') on any of last *three* syllables **Circumflex** (^) on any of last *two* syllables **Grave** () on *last* syllable only

Six Accent Rules

- Verbs are recessive: their accent recedes towards the first syllable (antepenult) as far as is possible.
- Substantives (Nouns, Pronouns, Adjectives) are retentive (persistent): They tend to keep their accents on the same syllable as in the "lexical" (or "dictionary") form.
- If the ultima is long, then the antepenult cannot be accented.
- If the ultima is long, and if the penult is accented, then it must be acute.
- A short ultima with a long penult must be a circumflex if it is accented.
- Acute on the last syllable (ultima) is changed to a grave when followed by another word.

Circumflex accent goes only on *long* syllables.

Accent on Antepenult

If short ultima and 3 or more syllables, then acute accent may be on antepenult

If *long ultima* and 3 or more syllables, then *acute* moves from long antepenult to penult.

Accent on Penult

- Circumflex only with a short ultima and long, accented penult.
- Acute on all other combinations.

Accent on Ultima

- If an acute accent is on the ultima followed by a word and no punctuation in between, then the acute changes to grave
- Circumflex in verbs usually indicates a contract verb

Procedure for Determining Accent:

- Place accent temporarily in "starting" position:
 - A. If Verb (remember, it has "recessive" accent), move as far back from ultima as rules will permit.
 - If noun (remember, it has "persistent" accent), look up word in dictionary and start with accent type and position as given in this "lexical" form.
- With accenting this "starting" position:
 - A. Use appropriate section of General Rules above
 - Find correct sub-section and accent according to syllable pattern.
